As part of their Imaginative Learning Project (ILP), our EYFS children have been reading their key text 'Once There Were GIANTS'. The book focuses on the transition of growing up.

The children considered the many ways they themselves have already 'grown up!'. The children used pictures of themselves as babies, toddlers and school-age children to create a timeline.



The children in Year 1 have been learning the story 'Dinosaur Roar' and both classes have created story maps to retell the story. This has

helped the children learn the story by heart. Both Mr Hughes and Miss McNally have been blown away with the children's enthusiasm for learning the story and retell it using some very creative story telling actions.









Year 2 welcomed Newquay Aquarium to school last week which really helped to bring their 'Beachcombers' ILP to life.

The aquarium brought in a selection of rockpool creatures and shared some incredible facts with the children. Did you know that a starfish has eyes in the ends of its legs?

Both classes loved getting up close with such exciting creatures and learning about how they are adapted to their habitats.





In Year 3, the children have been working on their sketching skills. Using photographs they took from their Mark's Arc visit, they worked really hard to try hard to replicate them. Mr Walters, Mrs Boynton and Mrs Waugh were

super impressed with their attention to detail.

The children then mixed watercolour paints to produce the different shades of colour they saw in each animal.







In English, Year 4 had the second of their 'experience lessons', introducing our new writing scheme - The Write Stuff. A mysterious

rucksack had been found, containing lots of clues as to who the main character in their new book might be. The children found binoculars, an explorers hat, a torch, a book, a screwdriver and a letter. Using the clues, they concluded that the main character is an explorer called Lucy, who is on a mission to find a mysterious whale. We can't wait to find out more about Lucy and her adventures!













The children in Year 5 have been focussing on coding in their computing sessions. Last week, they planned an algorithm to create a traffic light sequence and used a range of coding commands to program a simulation. The children worked to debug the program if the code didn't run efficiently.

In Art, the children have been learning about the famous artist, Hans

Holbein. They studied the famous portraits he has painted throughout history, including Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn.


The children have learnt how to create tints and shades of colours. "A tint is a

colour mixed with white paint, which increases lightness, and a shade is a colour mixed with black paint, which increases darkness". From this, the children successfully created a range of one colour, from the lightest to the darkest shades.









Year 6 have been studying the effects of an unhealthy lifestyle on how our heart functions as part of their 'Bloodheart' ILP.

They carried out an experiment which simulated a body that had narrowed or blocked arteries. They used different sized holes in various cups and then added some lard to act as a blockage.

The children timed the blood flowing out of the cup to see how these factors would affect blood getting to the heart. They found that the blood flowed much more slowly when the 'arteries' were narrowed or blocked. This led to a discussion about why people need to keep their heart healthy.

The children in our ARB enjoyed lots of different activities last week.

The children have continued to read the story, 'The White Owl' which has been linked to their phonics and maths lessons. They created their own owl art using feathers, paint, glue and googly eyes.

The children enjoyed making chocolate crispy 'nests' too. Yummy!


